heat quickly dissipated as the event unfolded into a beautiful and memorable evening.



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We Had A Gathering January Mini-Retreat



In lieu of our annual retreat, which was unfortunately canceled for 2024, the Roseville New Church community hosted a mini-Retreat, aptly named 'The January Gathering'. Despite the change in plans, the spirit and enthusiasm of our community were undiminished, as evidenced by the attendance of 20 dedicated members. Inspired by the theme of the cancelled retreat ("What's the Use"), the decision was made to build our min-retreat around the same, looking at the question of what is the use of church in today's modern society.

The gathering was marked by a series of engaging and thought-provoking presentations given by three presenters on Saturday. The event continued on Sunday with a service that included a celebration of the Holy Supper, providing a fitting conclusion to our time together.

The presentations sparked lively discussions among attendees, bringing forth a wealth of ideas that are sure to enrich future discussions, particularly at the upcoming April NCIA Assembly (see announcement on page 14).

Rev. Howard Thompson welcomed the attendees and lead our opening



worship. This worship explored the parable of the sower, likening the Lord to a farmer who plants the seeds of His teachings in the soil of our minds. Just as seeds need care to grow, so too do these spiritual truths require our love and attention to flourish. Unfortunately, in our minds these teachings can be lost or forgotten if we don't truly listen or



care for them, much like seeds that fall on bad soil. Teachings must be nurtured, removing selfish thoughts like weeds, and striving to live according to the Lord's guidance. By doing so, our spiritual garden can blossom and we

can offer the Lord the gifts He cherishes most: acts of righteousness, mercy, and humility. This process of spiritual growth and cultivation mirrors the Lord's desire for us to develop a deep, meaningful connection with Him and ultimately bear a bountiful harvest of spiritual fruits in our lives.

In our first presentation "Why Worry?: We Were Told This Would Happen" Rev. Ros Taylor addressed the concern of declining church attendance and religious affiliation. Through her presentation, she illuminated how Swedenborgian theology not only anticipates these trends


but also offers insightful ways to embrace and navigate through them. In an interesting (maybe even controversial) aside, Ros suggested that there exists a link between the rise and fall of major spiritual epochs in Western religion



and Earth's climactic changes, particularly heating and

cooling periods that lead to flooding. Ros posits that significant climatic events, such as those experienced during the various Dryas periods, have historically led to the

destruction of civilisations, subsequently influencing the development of human spirituality. According to this theory, major floods have not only wiped out physical communities but also symbolise

the end of certain spiritual eras due to the inundation of false ideas among the people of those times.

In his presentation "Uses of the Church" Rev. Howard Thompson provided an enlightening overview of Emanuel Swedenborg's writings about the role and relevance of the church in modern times, offering a renewed perspective on our spiritual community's purpose. The concept of "Usefulness," as articulated by Swedenborg, highlights that true love and wisdom are demonstrated through action and beneficial service. This idea is echoed across various philosophical and religious traditions, emphasising the importance of actions serving others and contributing to the common good. Howard emphasised the importance of organising the Church for spiritual uses, engaging in individual spiritual practices, and fostering communal activities to fulfil the Church's purpose in our rapidly evolving world. Howard's presentation was punctuated with several break-out sessions to discuss several different aspects of "usefulness" within the various manifestations of "Church."

In his presentation "Organ Transplants: A New

Church Perspective" Rev. Todd Beiswenger presented a fascinating exploration of the unique side effects experienced by organ transplant recipients. He discussed how Swedenborgian theology might offer explanations for these phenomena, adding a new dimension to our understanding of the human experience. Noting that 89.3% of participants in one study of organ transplant recipients reported changes in their personalities following the

transplant. One middle-aged woman who received the heart of a teenage boy reported a new-found appetite for beer and physical attraction to women. Todd posited that the spiritual mechanism that may be at play here is influx, which



Swedenborg writes is specific to the organs of the body. Suggesting that once influx is begun in a person that influx is "tied" to the organ and follows it in a transplant.

In his presentation "The Gospel According to Ted Lasso" Rev. Howard Thompson drew parallels between the themes of the popular TV series "Ted Lasso" and spiritual themes found within our faith. "Ted Lasso" effectively uses comedy as a medium to address serious themes concerning the human condition, such as revenge, forgiveness, personal growth, hatred, anxiety, greed, and the love of dominion. In the case of "Ted Lasso" comedy serves as an effective vehicle for delivering serious messages, as it disarms viewers, lowers their defences, and opens them up to new perspectives. The show's blend of humour and heartfelt storytelling allows people to connect with the characters and



their journeys, potentially inspiring them to address similar issues in their own lives. This work-in-progress presentation resonated deeply with the audience.

Video Recordings: We are currently working on

editing the videos of these presentations. Once completed, they will be made available for those who were unable to join us at The Gathering. These recordings promise to be a valuable resource for our entire community.

In summary, the January Gathering in Roseville was a testament to the resilience, commitment, and intellectual curiosity of our church community. The event not only provided a platform for learning and discussion but also reinforced our collective dedication to spiritual growth and understanding.

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Bible Study Update

For much of the year Howard runs a fortnightly Bible Study, Tuesdays from 11:00 to 1:00 in the Swedenborg

Centre. He will be doing so again in 2024, but with a delayed start.

Unfortunately, owing to the preparations required for



the mini-retreat and several other seen and unforeseen circumstances, I got on the back foot of several projects that require attention. Bible Study will resume for 2024, just not until late February. Please join us 27 February for our first class.

Our subject for study to begin this year will be the Sermon on the Mount. In this year's study we will compare and contrast the differing account of this discourse in both Matthew and Luke.

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Sermon Summary "One Thing" Rev. Howard A. Thompson

In a recent sermon by our minister, Howard Thompson, we explored the profound truths that define the New Church's approach to our spiritual journey and the means to attain its ultimate goal. Howard began by highlighting two fundamental principles: that the purpose of creation being the formation of heaven from the human race, and that the Lord gave us His Word as a means to unite with Him and accomplish the former.

Howard emphasised the vast chasm between Creation and Heaven, which we are all inclined to cross. The Lord desires for us to make this journey. He has bestowed upon us the



autonomy to choose our path. This sometimes making us feel distant from the Lord, even though His presence is unwavering.

Our own autonomy (a sometimes necessary evil) parallels with modern self-help trends that seem to offer quick, easy and

oversimplified solutions. True personal growth is multidimensional, involving physical, behavioural, intellectual, and spiritual aspects. Howard noted that how we approach any aspect of our life reflects our approach to everything, resonating with Swedenborg's teachings that our character is embodied in our deeds.

Howard used the story of Jacob's dream (Genesis 28), commonly referred to as "Jacob's Ladder," to illustrate our spiritual journey. It shows that while God oversees everything, it does not absolve us of our responsibility to act. The dream's imagery of a ladder signifies the path to God, and our recognition of this path is the first step towards spiritual awakening and growth.

While there is no single solution to spiritual transformation, there is a definitive first step – opening ourselves to the Lord through His Word. This step is crucial in establishing a comprehensive path of spiritual development.

This initial engagement with the Lord's Word is not the complete solution but the beginning of a journey that encompasses various dimensions of our spiritual lives. Engaging with the Word is not just reading about God but interacting with Him. Building upon this foundation, we address interconnected dimensions of our spiritual lives, such as cultivating a life of charity, deepening spiritual understanding, practicing repentance, and fostering a prayerful life.

Quoting Matthew 6:33, Howard reinforced that seeking the kingdom of God involves drawing close to the Lord and striving for spiritual, moral, and social good. This pursuit ensures our spiritual needs are met, with nourishment for our souls in the form of love and wisdom.

Swedenborg's writings were cited to further explain the importance of engaging with the Word. They emphasise that reading the Word not only brings us into the Lord's presence but also establishes communication with heaven, enlightening our minds and helping us understand truths.

Howard concluded by affirming that while there are many aspects of our spiritual lives that contribute to the progress we make in our journey, there is one singular starting step. The Lord desires that that singular step leads to living of life of usefulness to others, as we are born not just for ourselves but for the good of others.

Final Thought

"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."
(Joshua 24:15)

When you read, hear, or meditate on these words from Joshua what thoughts come to your mind?

For many, this declaration symbolises a steadfast commitment to faith in and worship of the Lord. Yet Swedenborg invites us to delve deeper into the essence of what it truly means to serve the Lord. Swedenborg challenges the notion that mere faith or worship in isolation is sufficient for salvation. He posits that genuine faith is inseparable from charity—expressing love through action towards others.

In other words, faith without some outward manifestation of an intention to do good for others is incomplete, akin to a tree devoid of fruit. Further, Swedenborg explains, that merely doing good to friends and family or because of some reward you will receive is no better. True worship encompasses living according to divine commandments, which fundamentally call us to love and serve our neighbour or, more accurately, the good within those we serve. This perspective shifts the paradigm from faith alone to a faith that is alive and active in the world.

Spiritual growth flourishes in community, through acts of charity and usefulness. Serving the Lord, therefore, is not confined to liturgical practices but is vividly realised in our daily interactions and service to others.

This understanding transforms the phrase "as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" into a holistic commitment to living a life of compassion, justice and kindness. It reminds us that true devotion to God is demonstrated through our love and service to our neighbour, making every act of kindness a divine service. Let this be a call to action, inspiring us to embody our faith through acts of charity, thereby bringing us closer to the essence of serving the Lord.
