Woke Like A Patriarch Are You Woke? Oh, I Hope So!

(Let me explain)

If you are engaged in the political battles that constantly rage or if, like me, you are a student of the dynamics of the political battlefield, you are most likely familiar with the term "woke." If you are not familiar with the term then I can guarantee that you are far more spiritually healthy than I am.

Originally rooted in African American Vernacular English, the term has come to describe a heightened awareness of

social injustices, particularly those related to race, gender, and class. In the broader cultural context, being "woke" means being aware of, and actively attentive to, important facts and issues, especially related to social justice and inequality.



Over time, "woke" has become a broader umbrella term encompassing awareness and acknowledgement of a variety of social and political issues beyond just race, such as LGBTQ+ rights, feminism, environmental issues, and more.



However, like many terms tied to socio-political movements, "woke" has also been subject to co-optation, commercialisation, and sometimes, derision. Critics argue that it has been overused or misused, often referred to as "performative wokeness," where individuals or


corporations publicly express progressive views primarily for self-promotion or profit rather than genuine advocacy. Conversely, some conservatives use "woke" pejoratively to criticise what they see as excessive political correctness or perceived left-leaning cultural shifts.

In short, while "woke" originally described a genuine awareness and commitment to social justice issues, its meaning has expanded and become more nuanced, reflecting both genuine advocacy and, in some cases, skepticism or cynicism about the sincerity of that advocacy. As conversations around these topics have intensified, "woke" has found itself at the center, illustrative of the larger cultural wars being played out in the public sphere.


Personally, I'm tired of hearing the term. Whether it's from my politically engaged friends complaining about "wokeness" and the damage it is doing to society or from the political talking heads on my newsfeed. My way of dealing with the conflict I see around me, is to reflect on what is really important and how have symbols and words been coopted to steer people away from their true import and distract people from what we should be focusing on.

And so, several weeks ago, I heard the term "woke" (pejoratively) one too many times. That point got me to thinking. Is being "woke" really a bad thing? I mean, were there any "woke" people in the Bible? What a great question, let's find out.

According to the dictionary I consulted, "woke" is the past tense of "wake" which means "to emerge from sleep." Now search the Bible for examples of people who "emerged from sleep" and you will find numerous examples, not the least of which was Jacob: Then Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I wasn't even aware of it!"
(Genesis 28:16) Of this specific passage Swedenborg, in his work Secrets of Heaven (3715), says the following: "Jacob woke from his sleep symbolises enlightenment. This can be seen from the symbolism of sleep, which means a dim state, compared to consciousness, which is a bright state. So in a spiritual sense, waking from sleep means being enlightened."



Wow! I want to be enlightened, don't you? So, why has "woke" become such a cultural lightning rod? It has only become a cultural lightening rod for those who enjoy engaging in the culture wars. I get it, culture wars are fun, they give us a great rush when we engage in them, a culture war high. That high comes from the sweet taste of righteousness...correction...That high comes from the sweet taste of self-righteousness. And if you are feeling self-righteous you are about as far away from emerging from sleep as you are far away from the Lord. To be clear, I'm not condemning the "left" or the "right," I'm cautioning all those who engage in the culture wars and believe that effort can add one moment to their life.



"Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be.

"Your eye is like a lamp that provides light for your body. When your eye is healthy, your whole body is filled with light. But when your eye is unhealthy, your whole body is filled with darkness. And if the light you think you have is actually darkness, how deep that darkness is!

"No one can serve two masters. For you will hate one and love the other; you will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and be enslaved to money." (Matthew 6:21-24)

So, where is your treasure? Where are the desires of your heart? Are they focused on the Lord or are they focused on the world?

In the Gospel of John, during His prayer for His disciples before His crucifixion, Jesus said, "I have given them your

word. And the world hates them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I'm not asking you to take them out of the world, but to keep them safe from the evil one. They do not belong to this world any more than I do." (John 17:14-16)



The Apostle Paul wrote about living in the world but not conforming to its patterns. For example, in Romans, he advises, "Don't copy the behaviour and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect." (Romans 12:2)

Now, on their surface the words "not of this world" might suggest separation from the cares of the world, separation from other people, isolation, a simple life, even vows of poverty. In the symbolic language of the Bible, however, "not of this world" simply means not embracing the evil and falsity the world offers. "Not of this world" means looking within yourself and seeing where evil and falsity have taken root. Seeing where evil and falsity have taken root within ourselves requires some serious spiritual work; the work of repentance.

The work of repentance is not done casually, not done in the few minutes before going into church and certainly not done if we continue the same behaviour again...and again...and again...and the world, we risk avoiding the deeper issues.

From Abraham to Lazarus many major figures in the Word are said to have slept and or awaken from sleep. Of this, Swedenborg explains that sleep often symbolises a state of spiritual obscurity or unconsciousness. Waking from sleep, therefore, can symbolise spiritual awakening or enlightenment, a transition from ignorance or unawareness to understanding and awareness of spiritual truths.

Let's return to the story of Jacob, my personal favourite "awakening" in the Word. Jacob was ambitious, cunning,

and opportunistic, securing his brother's birthright and deceiving his father for a blessing. After Jacob awoke (Gen. 28:16), a transformed Jacob recognised God's presence, becoming more spiritually aware, eventually striving with God, earning the name Israel, and maturing into

a patriarch of the Twelve Tribes. Jacob's waking up

represents a realisation or acknowledgment of spiritual truth. Our own "waking" can can mark an acknowledgment of spiritual truth as well.

The next time you hear the term "woke" I invite you to think to yourself; "I hope I'm woke, woke like a Patriarch." It just may help you to put culture wars in their proper context and focus on what the Lord is calling you to acknowledge. "Surely the Lord is in this place, and I wasn't even aware of it!" (Genesis 28:16).

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What Happens When People Stop Attending Church

While it's a deeply personal choice and undoubtedly true that any individual can lead a rich spiritual life regardless of their regular church attendance, there's an overarching societal narrative to consider when masses have distanced themselves from organised religious practices. As more people are coming of age without any foundational faith practice in their family of origin, the ripple effects on the community as a whole can be profound.

It is from this premise that I was interested to read a recent article in *The Atlantic*, a conservative-leaning American magazine focused on politics, foreign affairs, business and the economy, culture and the arts. The article was titled:

"What Really Happens When Americans Stop Going to Church." While it is a long article and I would not want to reprint it here without permission, I encourage you to seek it out online. I will also, however, give you my summary of the points made, acknowledging that what has been happening in America over the past decade is unique

to that nation. While the circumstances are unique, the broader question of what is lost when church is no longer a part of the fabric of society remains and, I believe, is worth reflecting on.



What Really Happens When Americans Stop Going to Church

Summary of an article by Daniel K. Williams that appeared in *The Atlantic*.

Recent trends show that many Americans are leaving the church, but contrary to common expectations, this isn't leading to a more secular or liberal nation. Historically, when church attendance dropped in areas like Northern Europe or the traditionally Catholic Northeast US, these regions adopted more liberal, secular pluralisms. However, in the southern Bible Belt and the rural Midwest, a decline in church attendance has intensified Christian nationalism and right-wing ideologies.

Surprisingly, many Christian nationalists seldom attend church. Data from a PRRI survey indicates only 54% of Christian nationalists attend church regularly. Similarly, "The Great Dechurching" by Jim Davis and Michael Graham reveals that many who exit the church continue to uphold evangelical Christian beliefs and remain staunchly Republican.

Churches, historically seen as polarising, actually have a depolarising influence, promoting harmony among members with differing political views. Leaving the church community might strip away these moderating influences, allowing political extremism to flourish. Interestingly, when people stop attending church, they often retain their Christian beliefs and transfer their passion into the political sphere.

Regionally, while historically Catholic areas like
Massachusetts and Rhode
Island maintain Democratic inclinations despite decreasing church attendance, areas with strong evangelical backgrounds like the South and rural Midwest continue to bolster culture wars and individual autonomy.

Various reasons account for declining church attendance, from dissatisfaction with church practices to the challenges of modern life, like Sunday work commitments. The "great dechurching" has major political implications. With church denominations no longer acting as a centrist political force, a chasm is growing between the post-Christian urban North and the post-churched Christian nationalists of the rural South. The decline in churchgoing doesn't mean the demise of Christianity but rather its distortion, with profound political ramifications.


Spotify: Modern Day Jukebox



Gems from Swedenborg

(A Side Project)

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Several years ago, while perusing the shelves of an antiques shop, a dear friend of mine happened upon a very small book that caught his attention. Though not a New Churchman, he nonetheless was very familiar with the name Swedenborg from our many conversations. The next time we were together he gifted me this little book; *Gems from Swedenborg*.



Published in the 1850's, *Gems* is a collection of passages by the Rev. T.O. Prescott, that he describes as "interesting and valuable in context, but "also in a seperate form."



Reading through roughly 250 entries it struck me that it would be interesting to update the collection in a unique way. Over the last several months I have been working through *Gems*, taking each subject and its referenced passages from the Swedenborg's Writings and distilling the subject down to a 100+/- word

summary. This is not a translation but a representation of the ideas expressed by the associated passages.

I am approximately halfway through the 250 entries and thought it time to see what other people think of the exercise. Following is the very first entry.

Heaven's Reality (GFWS - Pg 47)

Summary Title: "The Enduring Joy of Purposeful Action in Heaven: A Swedenborgian Perspective"

The 100 Description: Heavenly happiness is not derived from idleness, but from active engagement in good deeds and the pursuit of truth. The joy and pleasure from such activities are lasting and uplifting, unlike the fleeting satisfaction from inactivity. This activity revolves around performing useful services, deriving joy from goodness, and seeking wisdom in truths, which bestows true pleasure.


